HOLIDAY REPORTS

GOOG'S TRACK & ANNE BEADELL HIGHWAY TRIP (Sept/Oct 2022)

About 6 years ago, along with JP and John and From here we diverted onto a magnificent short Lyn Shinnick, Mike & Di Barker decided to 'go cut along Goog's Track through the googs Track bush' and see a bit of the outback.

John & Lyn wanted to see some "real bush" so Mike & Di guided them on some "loops" on the western end of the Anne Beadell Highway located in the Eastern Goldfields of WA (in explorer Frank Hann's country East of Laverton) and the Sandalwood country at Plumridge Lakes!

Of course, JP was not going to miss out on that pretty Goog's Lake after one!

Due to a lack of time to complete the whole of the Anne Beadell Highway (1300 kms) from Laverton to Coober Pedy, it was decided that we would travel in convoy for about 400 kms from Layerton to Neale Junction then head down south to Balladonia on the Eyre Highway and return home. It was always on our bucket list to drive the complete road through to Coober Pedy one dav.

The Anne Beadell Highway was constructed in 1952 by Len Beadell, a surveyor and road builder and named after his wife. Len had been charged with selecting and preparing a site for the British Atomic Bomb test sites during the scary Cold War after WWII. He recommended the extremely remote area near Maralinga in South Australia to the Australian/British Governments. The resulting access road stretched from Coober Pedy in the east to Laverton in the west directly through the Great Victoria Desert.

Our Anne Beadell Highway adventure came to fruition in late September this year when the Barkers and JP hit the road with a camper trailer for us and a camp stretcher and sleeping bag for JP. We decided to get the easy part over with first and cross the Nullarbor via the Hyden-Norseman gravel road with stops in Norseman (great Saturday night at Norseman pub with the locals), Madura (where we took a side trip to the limestone caves and fascinating paleontological fossil site on the coastal plain) and Nullarbor Roadhouse (with another loop to the excellent facilities at the "Head of Bight" whale watching center (although no whales showed up!) and finally Ceduna.

Goog's track is roughly 200 kms of sand dunes, some around 25 metres tall. Wonderful spring wildflowers of all colours were out, interspersed with Spinifex, Sheoaks, gnarled Eucalyptus, picturesque salt lakes and some low granite outcrops. Spectacular Mt Finke rises 360metres out of the dunes like an enormous lizard-like monolith or Si-Fi Sandworm.

Yumbarra Conservation Park and Yellabinna Regional reserve. This is an adventurous 4WD drive track (not for the faint hearted) through rolling, golden sand dunes covered in diverse

The following two days were challenging with an endless succession of rocking-n-rolling up and down magnificent long, deep, heavily scoured sand dunes as well as having to be towed up one of them by JP.

Once the spare tyre was removed from under our car and put on the roof rack of our 2 tonne camper trailer we were towing, it became much easier. The spare tyre had been acting as an anchor and digging into the sand and bogging us halfway up! A wonderful night under the stars watching the crescent moon going down below Mt. Finke with a campfire cooked meal and wine made for a memorable moment. The night sky was amazing with no light contamination to diminish the millions and millions of stars and the misty Milky Way.

After completing Goog's Track, with much relief, we travelled a couple of hundred kms on rugged corrugated gravel road beside the Trans Australia railway line past Tarcoola, Kingoonya to Glendambo on The Stuart Highway north of Woomera. Arriving in Coober Pedy Caravan Park, our next stop, we spent two days R&R, replenishing supplies, cleaning up, enjoyed hot showers, washed clothes and examined the attractions of the exciting opal town. The underground opal shops and unusual sculptures were very interesting. It also enabled us to contact family and let them know we had survived Goog's! Walking into town for an evening meal was fine but became a bit scary on the way home with a couple of groups of intoxicated locals creating a ruckus.

After completing Covid RAT's tests and sending photos of them to the Maralinga Aboriginal Head-quarters in accordance with our permit requirements, we refilled fuel & water tanks and commenced our long trip along the Anne Beadell, (forecast rain was not going to stop us!). The Anne Beadell "Highway" is really a quite challenging 4WD dirt track in pretty poor condition with some horrendous corrugations, rocky limestone sections and washaways deep enough to ensure we rattled all the way. The sandy dune areas around Tallaringa Conservation Park on the Western side of the amazing 1700km Dog

Fence provided some relief. Some unusually arranged Aboriginal? rock markings in the middle of the bush piqued our interest.

Two days spent at the rehabilitated atomic bomb test site at Emu was fascinating. The Atomic Bomb totem sites also displayed the results of the intense heat from the explosions with extensive fused slag like, glass sand fragments all over the ground.

After being stopped by Roger, the Aboriginal Ranger, and his wife from Maralinga Community south of Emu (checking on our permits) he recountered tales of WA prisoners and drug traffickers attempting to pass illegally through the Maralinga Tjarutja lands.

After a very windy, dusty and rain showery night we left Emu with storm clouds building towards Laverton. JP insisted he was very comfortable and dry in his waterproof Swag.

Sure enough, late the next day west of Voake's season in the 'Great Victoria Desert'! Many of the Hill Corner we hit quite heavy rain with water wonderful smallish red sand dune areas were flooding down the road and numerous muddy bog covered in lush green desert vegetation. Flower-sections.

We heard later that Warburton Community to the and marble gum and other varieties of woodland northwest had 75mm of rain and the Great trees. The diversity is quite spectacular and Central Road to Uluru was closed for 3 days! difficult to absorb on a short road journey. However the country side from here on was very attractive and clearly benefiting from a good rainy

season in the 'Great Victoria Desert'! Many of the wonderful smallish red sand dune areas were covered in lush green desert vegetation. Flowering spinifex, Emu Bush, Acacia, Eremophila, bright red Sturt's Desert Peas, brilliantly coloured Hakea, Grevillea and Christmas tree Mulga, interspersed with Black Oak Casurina, Native Poplar, Mallee Cyprus and gnarled Gidgee trees. The shady western Myall Acacia tree is very long lived with some estimates of up to 1000 years old! So many magnificent purple, yellow, white and pink wildflowers are scattered over the bush. Further west in Mumungari Conservation Park and the Neal Junction Nature Reserve, fields of wavy Astrostipia nitida grass are spread amongst beautiful, graceful, majestic, light barked desert and marble gum and other varieties of woodland trees. The diversity is quite spectacular and difficult to absorb on a short road journey.

Bird life seen included several Emu groups enjoying the rain puddles, Bush Bustards, Mallee Fowl (very lucky to see it scurrying away off the road) and Sand Grouse. Skittish lizards commonly warmed themselves on the road while other wild-life included camels, emus but surprisingly few kangaroos.

Crossing into WA on the western side of the impressive Serpentine Lakes we left the wonderful Mumungari Park and Maralinga Tjarutja Lands and entered the equally attractive country of the Spinifex People centered at Ilkurlka. The Ilkurlka Roadhouse is about halfway and after several days it was great to have a shower in the well set up camparound even if we did have to light the old donkey HWS for hot water (thanks JP!). It was actually a nicer shower than most caravan parks but no electricity! The price of fuel had been steadily rising as we travelled along but this topped them all at \$3.56 per litre. By this time vibrations from the horrendous road corrugations had sheared a bolt off Mike & Di's Landcruiser rear shock absorber and destroyed both our and JP's two way radio aerials. So most of the morning was spent (with fantastic and grateful assistance from the Ilkurkla Roadhouse supervisor) repairing some of the damage and contacting a mechanic in Laverton to arrange for delivery and fitting of shock absorbers for our cruiser when we arrived in 2 days' time. Luckily the roadhouse has a public satellite phone as mobile phone coverage had been non-existent since we left Coober Pedy. We were on the road again by lunchtime through the picturesque Neale Junction Nature Reserve woodland, with several herds of camels around and past the well-known landmark of Bishop Riley's Pulpit.

Our last night bush camping was at Yeo Lakes (without the horrible Sand Flies that Lyn Shinnick encountered on our last visit) before arriving in Laverton about mid-morning, At this point JP headed off to Kalgoorlie and home to Perth. We stayed a further two nights and had new shock absorbers fitted to the car as well as repairs to the towing electric cables for the camper van which had been torn off in some deep boggy puddles along the way.

Laverton caravan park was adequately comfortable for an outback town, and we enjoyed the relaxed helpful town people. The town was nice and clean with tidy streets and a great Visitors Centre catering for many travelers along Great Central Road to Warburton, Giles, Docker River and Uluru. We also had a surprisingly excellent meal at the local pub in the evening. David the Kiwi mechanic in Laverton with Desert Sands Mechanical, completed a rapid, excellent repair job on the Landcruiser and we departed for Kalgoorlie to spend a night with Di's brother and family before continuing home.
