The advantages we enjoy are:

- 1. The freedom to schedule bridge sessions, congresses and functions on any day and at any time;
- 2. The opportunity to hold teaching sessions and beginners' lessons at any time and make changes when required.
- 3. To permanently have everything in place with all the right equipment at our fingertips;
- 4. To put up notice boards and organise and decorate our clubhouse as we wish;
- 5. To access the premises at any time as required by directors, committee members, catering committee, members assisting with maintenance items to building and garden, card dealing, organizing trophies and updating boards, etc;

The provision of a fully equipped outsider venue which is available at any time for barbeques, bridge session intervals and other functions.

Whilst taking pride in this unique position we must also recognise the responsibilities involved. Having our own premises requires upholding the building structure and associated fixtures and fittings to maintain the growth and culture of the club.

This facility is originally due to the foresight, hard work and diligence of the Club Members from the 1970s and early 1980s. Over the years members have contributed their time, expertise and their money to retain this legacy in the preservation and enhancement of the Clubhouse for the enjoyment and convenience of all members.

24 April - 1 May 2023 - KALAMUNDA OPEN PAIRS


Much competitive fun was had by all on our home ground.

Did You Know?

By the Numbers (...continued)

The most common hand shape is 4-4-3-2 (21.5%), followed by 5-3-3-2 (15.5%), 5-4-3-1 (12.9%) and 5-4-4-2 (10.6%).

It has been estimated that there are more than 100 000 bridge clubs throughout the world. The three countries that have the most registered players are USA, China and The Netherlands.

Since the year 1900 there have been between 8000 and 10 000 books published in the English language on bridge. Tim Bourke of Canberra has one of the three largest bridge book collections in the world.

The biggest bridge clubs in the world are in Stockholm, New York and Denmark.

The total number of different hands possible in bridge (taking all four hands into account) is a little over 63 followed by 10 zeroes. The algebra needed to work that out is mind-boggling. It means, of course, that you could play bridge every day of your life and never come across the same four hands. Well, that keeps it interesting!

The ABF has a membership of approximately 35,000 and there are nearly 330 affiliated clubs throughout Australia.

THE GHAN TRIP

6 May to 16 May 2023

About 18 months ago we decided to complete another bucket list item. With JP & Jenny we booked a trip on the Ghan from Darwin through to Adelaide, a total of 10 days. We left the cold & rain in Perth and arrived in 30+degrees in Darwin. On Sunday we were taken by coach on an all day tour of the Lichfield National Park. During the day we visited Tolmer, Florence and Wangi Falls, all very beautiful with lush tropical surrounds. Amazing termite mounds were also on our list to see with detailed information about them from our guide.

Monday was a free day so we booked a tour of the World War II sites with a local RSL historian. This was a small group of only ten people and included a cruise on the bay which Jenny and I declined because of the rough water and wind. In the afternoon we wandered down to the foreshore markets where there were probably around 100 stalls selling all types of food and crafts.

On Tuesday we caught the Hop-On Hop-Off bus and toured Darwin's major tourist attractions such as the Museum an Art Gallery, Stokes Hill Wharf and the East Point Military Precinct.

The Ghan railway line was begun in 1877 and initially went from Port Augusta to Oodnadatta, a total of 665 kms. It was not completed until 2004 when the first train consisting of 43 carriages and more than one kilometer long left Adelaide on February 1 to journey to Darwin.

Wednesday morning saw us picked up from the hotel and taken to the Berrimah Railway Station by coach to board the Ghan. Cabins in our section (Gold) were very small with double bunks and a small ensuite bathroom. Platinum section cabins were much larger with a fold down double bed and much larger bathroom. Travellers were encouraged to spend time in the lounge c





ar and meet and chat to other passengers. The food and service in the Queen Adelaide dining car was excellent with all wines, beers and soft drinks included in the original booking price.

Three hours from Darwin the train stopped in Katherine and we enjoyed a cruise and walk in Nitmiluk Gorge with Indigenous guides explaining the importance of the surrounding area to the local Jawoyn people. Then it was back to the train where most of the travelling takes place after nightfall.

Day 2 saw us in Alice Springs and optional off board experiences were offered. We decided on the Alice Explorer which toured the Flying Doctor base, visited the Alice Springs Reptile Centre and toured the Alice Springs School of the Air. It was a most interesting day. That evening we attended an outback dinner at the historic Telegraph Station complete with a bush band and dancing.

On Day 3 the train stopped at Manguri, about 40 kms from Coober Pedy. Bus's transported those who wanted to see Coober Pedy into town but seeing as we had been there just 6 months before we stayed on the train and had a quiet day reading and sleeping.

We arrived in Adelaide on the Saturday morning, checked into our hotel and went for a walk around the city centre in the afternoon. Sunday was Mother's Day and a tour to the wine areas was planned. We drove to Mt Lofty lookout and then proceeded to visit Seppeltsfield and Lambert Estate wineries. The afternoon was spent in Hahndorf browsing the shops.

On Monday we booked another tour of Adelaide with morning tea at the Beerenberg factory and another stop in Hahndorf where several purchases were made. On Tuesday we had a morning flight and so arrived home mid-afternoon.
